

TASC (Teens Actively Serving Christ) was held in different areas of the country and sponsored by Reformed Mission Services. Our TASC group was held in Chino, CA June 24-July 1 with First United Reformed Church of Chino as the host church. Melissa, Becca, and Julia Dykstra, Jill and Brooke Jacobsma, and Anita and Ava Nykamp attended this service project. Other church groups that attended were from Caledonia, MI, Ripon, CA, and Visalia, CA.

Our scripture theme was II Timothy 1:9-10 which states, "He has saved us and called us to a holy life-not because of anything we have done but because of his own purpose and grace. This grace was given us in Christ Jesus before the

beginning of time, but it has now been revealed through the appearing of our Savior, Christ Jesus, who has destroyed and death and has brought life and immortality to light through the gospel."

When we arrived in Chino Saturday night, we were served a delicious meal at the church along with mixer games, singing, and prayer groups. We stayed in the Chino Church Life building. Our days began with delicious homemade breakfasts served by volunteers from the church. On Sunday, we attended morning and evening worship services with our TASC group with lunch served at church. We made so many NW lowa connections with people from the church, as well as with our fellow TASC group.

We began every day with personal devotions and breakfast served by volunteers from the church. Our group spent Monday working at Isaiah's Rock, a food bank and outreach ministry to the poor and hungry in Chino. Part of our group worked to clean and organize the backyard of the home this organization is based out of. We brought some organization to all the food and supplies in an area that really needed it. The other part of our group worked at the warehouse Isaiah's Rock uses to house all their donations of new clothes, shoes, household goods, and hygiene products. At times, all the work seemed overwhelming but we made so much progress sorting through donations and organizing them. It was a blessing to see how the kids all buckled down and worked hard and saw all the progress made. After a long day, a family from Chino Church hosted us at their home where we were fed supper and some of us enjoyed their backyard pool and lawn games. After supper, Pastor Tim Scheuers from Chino First URC led our evening session giving a message on our theme verse. A highlight was always the singing with our group which was done acapella. We ended the day with our prayer groups where we had such meaningful discussions of our lessons and scripture. Our prayers groups were a blend of people from all groups attending so it was great to get to know different youth and sponsors. To see our youth flourish and mature in their faith is so encouraging!

Tuesday our group served at Inland Christian Home, a senior living community in Ontario. We power washed the condos and apartments, cleaned windows and screens, patio areas, and did some weeding around the complex. The residents were so grateful and kind. We ate lunch at the retirement dining room and also had an ice cream social with some of the residents there. It was a very hot work day but the kids didn't complain and we were blessed to be a blessing at this retirement community. We had another evening at the home of a Chino First URC family with supper, pool time, and lawn games. We ended with our evening session again led by Pastor Tim, then back to church for our prayer groups before bed.

Wednesday and Thursday our groups were split. One group worked again at Isaiah's Rock and helped them with food distribution to the needy. Some of that group also painted for a church in Ontario. Another group went to the Union Gospel Mission in downtown Los Angeles. The mission was an incredible experience and to see those experiencing homelessness up close and personal was incredibly moving. Our group at the mission received a tour and history of the mission and were taken to the roof to see the LA skyline. We then helped prep food in the kitchen while others from our group served in the lunch line. The mission's goal is to get people back into society as productive members. They help those suffering from alcohol, drug dependency, or

have mental health issues. Those that seek help at the mission must commit to the program that requires them to leave the lifestyle of addiction behind. The mission has strict protocols for who can stay and what needs to be done to finish the program there. It is extremely well run and we were encouraged by the work of bringing the light of Jesus to those less fortunate. There were some leftover meals after serving lunch so there was a small number of us who were escorted by armed security to serve the plates to the homeless outside the mission. This was incredibly powerful, as well as sad to see. When we were finished, we were whisked back inside for our safety. We are so thankful for all the blessings we have after seeing Skid Row in downtown LA. The group that went to Union Rescue Mission on Thursday drove around the area surrounding the mission prior to arrival. We were able to see blocks of "homes" along buildings, which were merely tarps or tents. We were told that depending on the time of year, a 50-block area surrounding the mission has between 6,000-10,000 homeless people living on the streets. Wednesday, the day ended with another delicious meal at church, our evening message, and our prayer groups. Thursday evening was pizza and volleyball at a Chino First URC family along with our evening message and singing. We finished with prayer groups at church.

Friday was our day away to Balboa Beach. It was a wonderful day at the Pacific Ocean. Those waves are powerful by the way! A beautiful day of relaxing with an ocean view, swimming, shopping at the beach front shops, as well as a very competitive beach volleyball tournament! Many of us chose to have lunch at Ruby's, a 50's diner themed restaurant at the end of the pier. We wrapped up our time together with a bonfire and hotdog roast. The acapella singing at the beach was amazing as the sun was setting. This was a fitting end to our week. It was an emotional goodbye to a very impactful week of serving Christ. After arriving back at the church, many of our group chose to do an "all nighter" with the kids spending a night of fun in the youth room with a lot of noise and games! Thanks to the sponsors who chose to stay up and chaperone this group while others of us went to bed! Saturday started very early as we all left Chino to make our way back home.

We are so thankful for all the prayers of the congregation while we were serving on TASC in California! We were also thankful for safe travels and no delays with our flights. We were so blessed to work and serve among those less fortunate. We were also encouraged with our fellow members in Christ we met on TASC. Feel free to ask any of us about our experiences. We're back! What a great week we had at Asbury University in Wilmore, Kentucky. After a delicious lunch prepared by youth group parents, for us and our families, twelve young people and five sponsors loaded up into Stanton Visser's van and Loren Dykstra's pick-up. We also took 22 cornhole boards along because we were in charge of that tournament. There were phone games, travel bingo, and some off-key singing in the van as we traveled. Definitely not ready for the talent show!

Our Sunday night was spent in a beautiful VRBO in Savoy, Illinois. After claiming rooms and moving in, we played "whack". Doug is not very good at this game...We prepared a hot breakfast Monday morning and were on the road by 8:00 and in Kentucky at 3:00 p.m. We received a warm (temperature) welcome. By 8:00 p.m., 850 youth were moved in and seated in the auditorium, where we were blessed by Rev. Ken Anema, one of two keynote speakers. Ask our youth "What are your hope, riches and power in Christ?"

Each night our youth groups met as a "Son-Set" group, summarized, discussed and evaluated what we'd heard and learned. Each morning, two sponsors led groups of 6-8 young people we'd never met, as a "Son-Rise" group. These were small, same-gender groups that met for discussion and prayer from 8:00-9:00 p.m.
